

# **About Royal MTC**

When the Winnipeg Little Theatre and Theatre 77 merged to form the Manitoba Theatre Centre in 1958, the goal was to produce great theatre with mass appeal. Artistic Director John Hirsch and General Manager Tom Hendry staged professional productions of an eclectic array of plays – classics, Broadway hits and new Canadian work. With the establishment of a second stage for experimental work in 1960, and an annual provincial tour that began in 1961, MTC fully realized the original vision of a centre for theatre in Manitoba. Inspired by the breadth and quality of MTC's programming, a whole network of what became known as "regional theatres" emerged across North America.

The company produces in two venues: the Warehouse, which opened in 1969, and the Mainstage, completed in 1970. The theatres were renamed after the company's founders in 2008. In 2009, the Government of Canada designated the Mainstage a National Historic Site and, in 2010, Queen Elizabeth II granted the company a royal designation.

Today, the Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre produces 10 plays on two stages, a regional tour, a wide range of youth programming and two annual festivals: Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work (founded in 2021) and North America's second-largest Fringe Festival (founded in 1988). Attendance for Royal MTC programming averages 300,000 each year, and many Manitobans also support Royal MTC with donations and volunteer time. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Kelly Thornton and Executive Director Camilla Holland, Royal MTC remains Manitoba's flagship theatre.

The Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre is proud to call Manitoba home. Royal MTC is located in Winnipeg on Treaty 1 territory, the lands of the Anishinaabeg, Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota and Dene peoples, and the National Homeland of the Red River Métis. We are thankful for the benefits sharing this land has afforded us, acknowledge the responsibilities of the Treaties, and embrace the opportunity to partner with Indigenous communities in the spirit of reconciliation and collaboration.







The Board of Trustees expressed unanimous support for the renewed Strategic Plan that will guide us through 2026. Camilla Holland (Executive Director) and Kelly Thornton (Artistic Director) along with their senior leaders continue to reconsider the current business model, develop a recovery strategy and most importantly, plan for growth. It would be irresponsible for any of us to simply focus on trying to restore what existed before the pandemic, because the world has changed in fundamental ways.

I want to acknowledge our dedicated staff - you are what makes the magic happen. Over the past few years as the pandemic unfolded, you were asked to constantly pivot, develop, implement creative solutions and deal with difficult new realities. You have shown a strong commitment not only to the theatre but to our patrons and our community. It is our employees and their extraordinary focus, energy and dedication who truly enabled Royal MTC to deliver our organizational priorities.

We are deeply grateful for the sustaining support of our funders, sponsors and donors. Our public funders - Canadian Heritage, the Canada Council for the Arts, the Manitoba Arts Council, the Province of Manitoba, the Winnipeg Arts Council and the Winnipeg Foundation - provide essential foundational support. Manitoba is an incredibly generous province, and we are the grateful beneficiaries of that largesse with the growing and deep commitment of individual donors. Along with wonderful sponsors and corporate supporters, this critical private sector support allows MTC to grow and thrive.

The entire organization benefitted from her spirit of curiosity, careful consideration and calm demeanor when facing challenges, large and small. # MESSAGE FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



When I arrived in Winnipeg four short years ago, I came with a vision that honoured the past, while setting a course for our future. I was charged to consider our relevance, with a goal to truly become a theatre for all Manitobans. Delivering my first full season of programming has shown clearly that we're still very much in pursuit of this goal.

We approached this season with a dose a realism, charting a course for recovery that would entertain and enlighten our audience. We wanted to satisfy those supporters who have been with us for many years, and welcome warmly those who step through our door for the first time. Theatre is a place for everyone, and whether familiarity greets us on stage, or we witness a lived experience that is not our own, the universal human condition unites us.

The 2022/23 season was greeted with joy and enthusiasm. The long intermission that COVID bestowed upon us had robbed so many Manitobans of their favourite pastime. Audience members, with wide-eyed wonder, would stop me to say how thrilled they were to be back, how they had almost forgotten how special theatre was to them. If proof is in the numbers, then we have much to celebrate. The PRA rating summary shows the 2022/23 Mainstage season as the highest patron-rated season in the last decade, with 86% scoring our work 4 out of 5 or above.

The season delivered so many memorable moments, but the show that will remain forever engraved in my heart is Rosanna Deerchild's *The Secret to Good Tea*. It truly was a transformational experience for this organization and our audiences. Developed in Pimootayowin Creators Circle, the play marked our first world premiere production for an Indigenous playwright on the John Hirsch Mainstage and as we laughed, cried, and sat in wonder as the teepee was erected, we truly experienced the sacred power of theatre.

Overall, it was a season that delighted so many, a season where my audience finally got the chance to know me and savour a full uninterrupted playbill. A season where we made great strides in our road to recovery. My profound thanks to the artists who made this possible, for their stirring and spectacular performances throughout the season. Special thanks go to the understudy artists who worked tirelessly to ensure we were able to deliver almost all of our planned performances without interruption.

I want to thank the incredible staff who worked so hard to reboot our operations. Your passion and dedication to our work, our artists and our audience is inspiring. A special ovation to Camilla Holland, who was by my side. To the Board of Trustees, who are the best ambassadors for what we do, I also express my deepest gratitude. I salute Laurie Speers, who has brought such heart to her role as Chair, and a calm, clear approach as we steer this ship through stormy waters, and to John Guttormson, whose leadership throughout the COVID hiatus was exemplary.

George C. Wolfe wrote, "When art is created, it is not created strictly by an individual. A culture, a people, a time, and a place created it."

The 2022/23 season is an expression of all of us as we pursue truth, beauty and, above all, joy in the art we bring to this world.

# Winnipeg Fringe Theatre Festival

The 35th annual Winnipeg Fringe Theatre Festival brought the city together for an in-person celebration of indie theatre for the first time in three years. Featuring local, national and international performing companies, the festival showcased dramas, musicals, comedies, stand-up and improv. The ticketed attendance totalled 59.845 with 56 sold-out performances and \$536,365,50 in box office revenue returned to the performing companies. Audiences were delighted by 111 performing companies with 983 performances. Instead of accepting a new round of lottery applications, the Fringe honoured the previously accepted cohort of artists that had originally been slated to perform at the postponed 2020 festival.

For the very first time, Fringe offered 100% of tickets in advance. Also new to the festival was the inclusion of \$10 door tickets for those 25 and under for all ticketed performances.

# Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work

Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work showcased the first public readings of six new plays written by the second cohort of the Pimootayowin Creators Circle. From September 27 to October 1, 2022, Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre welcomed audiences to the Tom Hendry Warehouse lobby to enjoy the free script reading festival.

This year's works included Maybe This Afternoon written by Rhonda Apetagon and directed by Katie German; The Rapturous Promises of Love and Death written by Trevor Greyeyes and directed by Katie German; Waawaakeshi written by Nova Courchene and directed by Charlene Van Buekenhout; Non-Machinable written by Cynthia Wolfe-Nolin and directed by Katie German; Cory and Daisy by Bridget Courchene and directed by Simon Miron; and Blood Sisters written by Elizabeth Denny and directed by Charlene Van Buekenhout. 24 local artists helped bring these shows to life as actors and directors.

The Pimootayowin Creators Circle is led by Governor General Award-winning playwright Ian Ross and Assistant Program Director Katie German, who help guide Indigenous artists in playwriting. Pimootayowin is an Anishinaabemowin word meaning *Journey*, a word chosen by Ross who likens the creation of new art to a journey.

The next Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work will be presented from September 24-29, 2023.


# Literary Development

Royal MTC is thrilled to have presented three world premiere productions, New by Pamela Mala Sinha, The Secret to Good Tea by Rosanna Deerchild and Burning Mom by Mieko Ouchi as a part of the 2022/23 season. Each of these plays were written by women from the Canadian IBPOC community and touched the hearts of audiences with their connections to family, love and intergenerational strength. Another world premiere, The Comeback by Trish Cooper and Sam Vint, has completed development and will be debuting in 2024 as a part of the Mainstage season.

This year, the Pimootayowin Creators Circle welcomed six new artists to each write and workshop a new play which will be presented at the Pimootayowin Festival in the fall of 2023. The cohort included Mary Black, Ryan Black, Mike Lawrenchuk, Emily Meadows, Victoria Perrie, and Eric Plamondon. The Pimootayowin Creators circle is led by Governor General Award-winning playwright Ian Ross and assisted by Katie German. Two scripts from the first group of creators – *Elevate* by Dave McLeod and *Redemption Tax* by Tracey Nepinak – received continued development. The Pimootayowin Creators Circle was generously sponsored by **TD Ready Commitment**.

We were excited to welcome playwright Marie Barlizo for two residencies at Royal MTC with support of the Canada Council for the Arts. Marie, while developing her epic trilogy *The Betrayal Project* continued her writing of *The Fall* (part 1) and workshopped *The Warrior* (part 2). *The Warrior* underwent two in-person workshops with artists from the Winnipeg community. Playwright Joseph Aragon has continued development of his musical *Rizal*, which resulted in a workshop and invited read/sing-through led by director Nina Lee Aquino for a public audience. Royal MTC has commissioned the piece with the intent to produce this work.

Overall, we invested in the development of 14 new scripts and hired 41 artists to work on readings and workshops. These diverse activities are invaluable to the playwright's process, and ensure there is a strong pipeline of new work heading to the stage.



# EXPANDING THE THEATRE EXPERIENCE

# National Mentorship Program

From January - May of 2023, Royal MTC hosted its third session of the National Mentorship Program. This annual program aims to help Manitoban theatre practitioners overcome the barriers of geographic isolation to build a web of connections and opportunities. The National Mentorship Program is a part of Royal MTC's commitment to nurture and support our local talent pool, connecting the brightest emerging talent with the most innovative and exciting talent from across the country. Over five months, mentors and mentees scheduled one-on-one meetings to discuss theatre, leadership, skill development, personal growth and more. The program culminated in a pancake breakfast where current and past mentees gathered in person for the first time since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic to discuss the impact of the program. The National Mentorship Program was generously supported by **RBC Emerging Artists**.

# Scholarships and Apprenticeships

In recognition and celebration of two Winnipeg personalities who contributed to our theatre's development, Royal MTC established the Jean Murray - Moray Sinclair Theatre Scholarship Fund. This fund awards scholarships to successful applicants who are full-time students attending accredited theatre schools or university theatre programs, and who intend to pursue a career in theatre.

Royal MTC awarded a total of **\$25,000** for the 2022/2023 academic year/theatre season, **\$6,031** of which was donated by our generous patrons through "pass-the-hat" performances of *Caplurnia*.

# **ASL-Interpreted Performances**

Royal MTC offered American Sign Language Interpreted performances of Let's Run Away on December 13, 2022 and Burning Mom on May 14, 2023 arranging for ASL-users and members of the Deaf community to have seats with clear sightlines to take in the interpreter and the action onstage.

# **Audio Described Performance (New!)**

Royal MTC offered an Audio Described performance of Yaga on April 19, 2023. During audio described performances, audience members who are blind or have low vision use a receiver and earpiece to hear about the physical action and visual elements of the production. These descriptions are voiced live, in real time, by a trained describer.

# **Backstage Pass**

This season-long program gave grade 11 and 12 students an in-depth look at theatre. Students attended five theatre workshops led by members of Manitoba's professional theatre community followed by a matinee performance of the current Mainstage production. Participants were selected based on their application and teacher recommendations. 26 were accepted into the program from College Louis-Riel, Churchill High School, Fort Richmond Collegiate, Windsor Park Collegiate, Daniel MacIntyre Collegiate Institute, River East Collegiate, Steinbach Regional Secondary School, Vincent Massey Collegiate, Tec Voc High School, Immanuel Christian School, St. Mary's Academy, Grant Park High School, JH Bruns Collegiate, Nelson McIntyre Collegiate, Kildonan East Collegiate and home school.

**INTO THE WOODS** • Jillian Willems, who choreographed the production, took participants through different ways to develop movements and used them to tell a story.

**TROUBLE IN MIND** • Secrets of theatre magic were revealed by Kari Hagness who shared stories from her time as the MTC Head of Props, taught techniques for script analysis, and encouraged participants in creating fake food from unconventional materials.

**THE SECRET TO GOOD TEA** • The participants dove into the creative process of writing for the stage with the guidance of playwright, director, performer, and Assistant Director of Pimootayowin Creators Circle Katie German.

# Theatre for Young Audiences

Royal MTC schedules student-only matinee performances for selected productions. This year, MTC offered student-only matinees for six productions: Network, The Three Musketeers, Into the Woods, Trouble in Mind, The Secret to Good Tea and New. A total of 3,039 students attended student-only matinee performances and 2,897 students attended regular performances with their school, for a total of **5,990 students** at shows this season. Approximately 2,175 students and teachers stayed for a talkback with actors after attending a performance.

Winnipeg's River Heights School was producing *Into the Woods Jr.* for their school play and attended our student-only matinee. As well, three actors from MTC's production met with the students over Zoom to answer their questions about preparing roles and life in the theatre.

# Student Placement

In 2022/23, Royal MTC hosted a student from Seven Oaks Met School for a weekly placement from October-April. Grade 10 student Tatiana worked with Patron Services, Communications, Education and Enrichment, Fringe, and Development to help with administrative tasks, event set-up, research, ushering shows, sourcing social media ideas and proofing documents. Upon completion, Tatiana was offered a summer job working at the box office during the Fringe Festival.

# **Enrichment Guides**

Enrichment guides were compiled for all ten shows of the Mainstage and Warehouse seasons. These guides were posted online for educators, students, and all other patrons to provide extra insight into our productions. They included plot synopses, playwright biographies, contextual background, glossaries, suggested classroom activities for educators and/or discussion prompts, and links to other resources including books, articles, videos and podcasts. Creators and contributors from outside of MTC included Arindam Sarkar, Desiree Pappel, Jessy Ardern, Sarah Farrant, Seraph-Eden Boroditsky and Tala Gammon.

# Digital Content for Educators -Theatre People

The Theatre People Virtual Series offered educators the opportunity to bring theatre to their classroom for free, by introducing a theatre artist or craftsperson for a 45-minute presentation and question-and-answer period. Virtual visits were presented to **eight classrooms** with a total of **194 students** who learned about properties, acting and playwriting.

Theatre People also encompasses an online library of job descriptions with an emphasis on the wide variety of roles in theatre and the way that students are already learning and using applicable skills in their lives.

# Theatre Under 30

Theatre Under 30 is a free membership program for young people aged 18-29. Members have exclusive access to world-class theatre for just \$20 a seat! In the 2022/23 season, the program had 1,589 members. **410 members purchased a total of 1,085 tickets** throughout the year.

# Play on Words

The Winnipeg Public Library's talented Librarians provide amazing Explore More reading lists of resources that help you better connect with the play. In 2022/23, librarian-recommended reading lists were created for New, Into the Woods and The Secret to Good Tea.

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




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
